## Board To Discuss

### Single Scale For Wages On C.Z.

A single salary scale to cover employees of the Panama Canal Company-Government will probably come up for discussions at the regular quarterly meeting of the Board or Directors to be held at Balboa Heights on January 12.

It is understood that for sometime now the Canal Administration has been considering plans for a complete change in its wage structure. The exact details of the change have been secretly guarded and Balboa Heights declined to discuss the question this week.

The agenda for this meeting is now being drafted and will be published later.

Attention is expected to be given to the current operating status of the company at mid-

### Total Blindness For Victim Of Lye Dousing

Undergoing an operation for the removal of one of his eyes, damaged from a dousing with lye inflicted by his wife George McIvey, popular Colon resident, was reported this week to be unable to see with the other impaired optic and is now suffering total blindness.

The statement was given by a close relative who visited him early this week, but official confirmation has not been obtained.

Mrs. Eulalee McIvey, who administered the caustic bath to her husband while he was abed following a jealous quarrel, is still on bail, and the case has not been called pending changes in the condition of the victim.

### Postmaster Slashed, \$800 Disappear

BOCAS DEL TORO. — Two chest wounds and a slash on the left hand were inflicted on Domingo Jovane, postmaster of Base Line, Changuinola by an attacker late Sunday night 12th, and \$800 robbed from the post office safe by an unknown attacker.

The postmaster reports that at a late hour of the night he was aroused by a man outside pleading for an urgent money order to make the morning mail. He got out of bed to answer the call and as soon as the safe was opened, he was pounced upon by the man who slashed him with a sharp weapon.

While Jovane was weltering on the floor in blood the burglar grabbed \$800. in bills and made a getaway with the loot.

The injured man was rushed, on motorcar 16 miles to the Chiriqui Land Company's Almirante Hospital where he was a

# Five W. I. Colonies To Get Self-Rule

LONDON—Five more colonies in the Caribbean will receive new constitutions and partial self-government, the British Government announced Wednesday, in the development of a new policy to replace the old pattern of colonialism, which has been increasingly condemned at home and abroad.

The territories which have a combined population of 315,000, are Antigua and St. Kitts-Nevis in the Leeward Islands, and Grenada, St. Lucia and St. Vincent in the Windwards.

Colonial Secretary Alan T. Lennox-Boyd has approved the plan in principle. The constitutions will give the islanders the right to elect four out of nine members of their Executive Councils. In fact, this will constitute a working majority, since the governor and administrator will be required to abstain from voting, except to break ties.

The councils will receive the effective power to legislate in all non-fiscal matters.

Britain will retain control over finances and the governors will be responsible for the civil services of islands.

## HISTORIC LETTER BOUGHT FOR \$5000

LONDON. — A historic letter written by Simon Bolivar, South American Liberator, to King George IV of England in 182 was auctioned in London Wednesday for 1,500 pounds. A bookseller bought it.

The letter besought the King to grant amnesty to British subjects who fought with South Americans to set up the independent state of Colombia.

## Panama-Born A. F. L. Official Sees Bright Future For Country

Panama's greatest potentialities lie ahead and can best be realized by new and old generations of Panamanians, regardless of their origin, working together in a cooperative effort, the TRIBUNE was told on Thursday by a Panama-born official of the Dress Joint Board of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union. This agency is comprised of four locals whose entire membership is about 70,000. Maida Springer, also Business Agent and Representative of the Dressmakers Union, Local 22, International Ladies Garment Workers Union, says that

she was unable to make any comparison between the time when she left the Isthmus as a child, and her return here now as an adult.

However, she admits following the development of the Republic closely through the years by means of Panamanian friends in New York who never seem to lose touch with their native land.

PARIS. — France reluctantly, and by a narrow margin of 27 votes, agreed to the re-arming of Germany, her ancient enemy. The vote was taken Thursday after an 11-day debate in the Assembly on the question of confidence in the government of Mendes-France.

## Labor Group Wins St. Lucia Election

CASTRIES, St. Lucia.—Labour solidarity, evinced in the rhythmic regularity of the refrain "Charles—James—King" by the presiding officer during the count gave all three vacant seats on the Castries Town Board to candidates sponsored by the St. Lucia Labour Party in the recent election.

A total of 1,528 votes were cast for the Labour Party whose candidate, Mr. Donald Batchelor James, barrister-at-law, topped the polls with 563.

It was the keenest fight in municipal elections for many years. A record number of over a thousand voters turned out to cast their ballots.

## 30 Afro-Asiatic Nations Asked To Form New Bloc For World Peace

LONDON.—A new force in international affairs is emerging from the two-day conference of the prime ministers of five non-communist Asian countries held Monday and Tuesday in Bogor, Indonesia.

While full agreement was not stated on other issues, a resolution was unanimously passed

calling a thirty nation conference of African and Asiatic nations including Japan and Red China, — but omitting Nationalist China, to take place

## Cobalt-Bomb Can End All Life Says Pioneer Atom Scientist

LONDON.—A deadly cobalt-bomb, capable of "poisoning whole regions more or less indefinitely," can be made by either the United States or Russia, declared a Nobel-Prize winning scientist Monday.

He warned that the new type of bomb, if used in "sufficient quantities," could "end all life on the planet."

Prof. Frederick Soddy, a pioneer in the development of several key atomic theories, said in an interview that either of the two major atomic powers and Britain, can produce a so-

called "cobalt bomb."

"So far as I know, or can imagine," Soddy said, "there is no difficulty whatever for anyone who can make an ordinary atomic bomb to make a cobalt bomb."

"It merely means using cobalt-metal (instead of a very dense metal like gold or platinum) as the tamping."

India, Sir John Kotelawala of Ceylon, Dr. Ali Sastroamidjojo of Indonesia and U Nu of Burma.

Among the nations to be invited are: Afghanistan, Cambodia, Central Africa Federation, Egypt, Ethiopia, The Gold Coast, Iran, Iraq, Japan, Jordan, Laos, Lybia, Liberia, Nepal, Nigeria, The Philippines, Saudia-Arabia, the South Rhodesia Federation, Sudan, Syria, Thailand, Turkey, Vietman and Yemen.

The two day conference expressed "grave preoccupation" over the "destructive potential" and "long range effects" from nuclear and thermo-nuclear arms, and asked that an end should be put to atomic weapons.

While the agenda of the forthcoming parley has not been completed in detail, the principal objectives, it was announced, are to consider:

1) The problems and special interests of the Asian and

African nations, as affects national sovereignty, racial problems and colonialism.

2) To contemplate the position of the Asiatic and African countries in the world today and the contribution they can make towards effecting world peace and cooperation.

3) Foment goodwill and cooperation among the Asiatic and African nations, and explore their common defense and mutual interests.

4) Consider the problems in relation to the social, cultural and economic life of the countries represented.

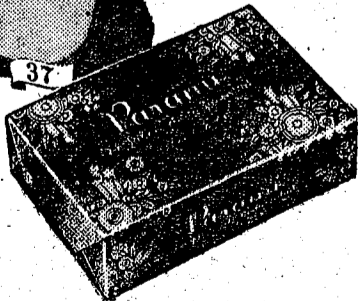

# Sees Bright Future For R. P.

collections have dwelt upon the skills which the robust West Indians brought to Panama from their diverse island homes," Mrs. Springer stated.

"These skills," she explained, "were fused with those of the native population and have undoubtedly contributed to Panama's rapid growth and expansion."

"The West Indian community as known by my parents, is succumbing to the ravages of time. It is true that there are still several West Indians of prominence on the Isthmus, but with all due respect to their high sense of civic responsibility and their interest in still fighting to better the conditions of their members, age has taken its toll, and today that community is fast dwindling."

Regarding her own generation, she said: "many of them left our native land ostensibly for superior training abroad to return in later years. For the most part after acquiring technical knowledge and a variety of professions, they unfortunately remained in countries where there was already an abundance of technicians and professionals."

"This failure to have come back to Panama, fully equipped with special skills and technical training, has slowed the pace of complete integration in the economic growth of Isthmian life."

According to Mrs. Springer it was her "understanding that the present generation (Panamanians of West Indian origin) has an unparalleled opportunity for higher education and professional advancement." This being the case, she observed, it was her "New Year's

wish that they use the skills learned and the leadership developed to enhance Panama's status in world affairs."

Despite its size Mrs. Springer noted that Panama's importance in world affairs was universally recognized, thanks to its favorable geographic position. "Of greatest concern to the citizens of Panama, therefore, should be their collective contribution to making this nation's international status more secure

and positive," she declared.

As the visiting AFofL official saw it there is a challenge extended for each group on the Isthmus. "This challenge is for the new and old generations of Panamanians, regardless of their origin, to decide on a cooperative effort and work together for the realization of this country's greatest potentialities in the years that lie ahead," she said.

Mrs. Springer, accompanied by her godmother, Mrs. Paul Taylor, visited the place where she was born at No. 14 Mariano Arosemena, in San Miguel. She also spent some time with her grandparents in Chiva Chiva

where they live on tenanted lands from the Canal Company.

Mrs. Springer's only child, a son of 25 years, is a graduate lawyer from NYU and is now serving in the U.S. Army. She is on holiday and has been house-guest of the Paul Taylors of Rio Abajo. On Sunday she leaves for Mexico to spend a week before returning to her Manhattan office.

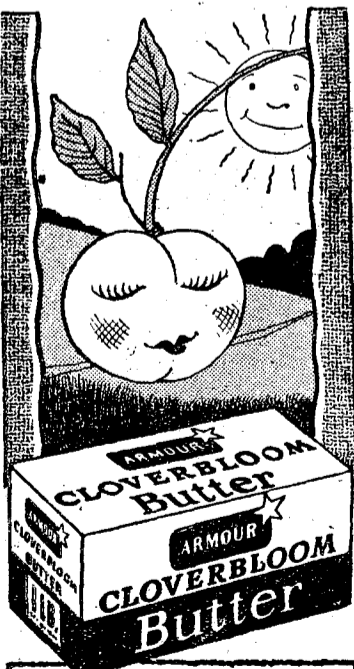

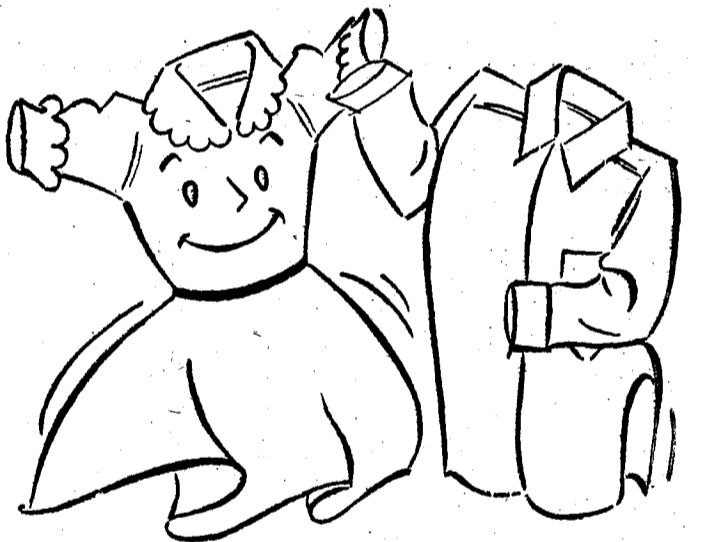

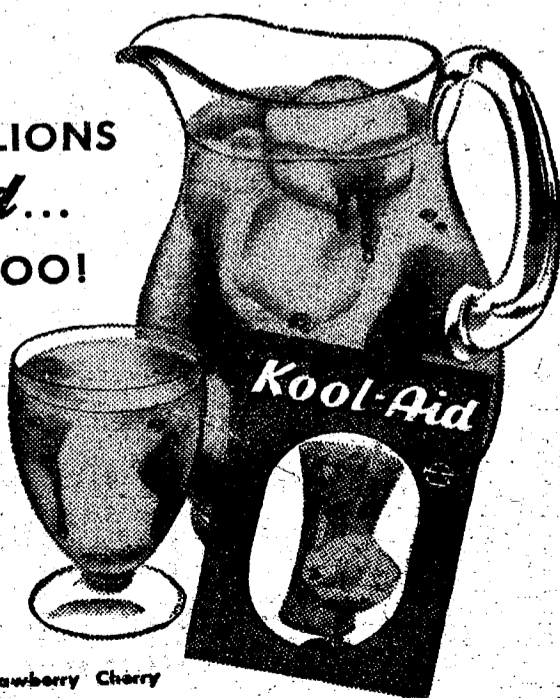

The tournament committee headed by William Arthur Sr. announced that regular tennis rules will govern the tournament, and that other matters relating to the activity will be released within a few days.

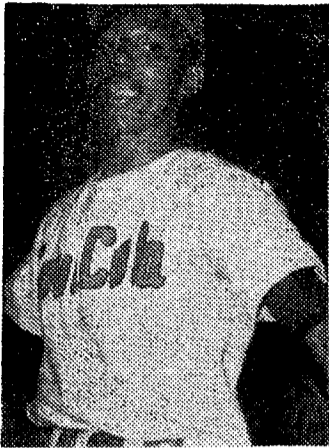

## Year Of Uncertainty—Year Of Hope

ANOTHER year has joined its predecessors in the oblivion of the past. Another year has become history's accomplished fact. Another year has made its mark of fortune or misfortune—to be remembered by some with pleasure and others with grief. But whatever are the individual emotions, we can recall this year just passed as one in which the picture of universal peace has not been so forebodingly dark.

THE NEW YEAR 1955 has come upon us, and as usual we casually make fine resolutions only to break them as time goes by. As in all beginnings we see the picture of a bright future, or at least entertain the hopes that the next day will be better than the previous one, as far as our fortunes go.

In the midst of a growing line of unemployed during 1954 Panama has maintained a commendable degree of prosperity. There was no national bread-line and soup kitchens. This can be attributed to the many organizations of charity which seek out and take care of that "poor we have always with us." An increase in the disability relief allowance to super-annuated Canal employees helped to keep the wolf from the door and prevent starvation in many sectors of the community.

Another favorable aspect of the 1954 picture is the stability of Government accomplished since October 1954 under the leadership of Col. Jose Antonio Remon. Whatever their failings, President Remon and his cabinet have sought to maintain peace and stability within the borders of the Republic to the peace of mind of its inhabitants. This peace generated confidence, faith and hope in the administration.

In the year just passed, we have seen some national progress on the social and spiritual fronts. Although this progress has been excruciatingly slow, we, like the world, have come to accept and recognize the dignity of the individual and his inalienable right to the legitimate pursuit of happiness. If 1954 has left a heritage, it is the heritage of hope for constant and consistent progress in human relations on the universal scene.

We go into the New Year strengthened and encouraged by this hope and faith in the goodness of mankind and his innate desire for that dignified peace and brotherhood to which all men of goodwill aspire.

This column cannot in good conscience vouchsafe a prediction of a rosier 1955 for our people. We see ominously dark clouds on the horizon. From the trend of the past year, we see in the crystal ball additional unemployment by mid-year and the unfavorable reaction and repercussion of some ambitious projects.

But we are sanguine that whatever ill and deleterious effects may be in the offing, a people ready to lend every cooperation for the good of the country, will be firm and resolute in their patriotism and goodwill to "straighten up and fly right."

It is possible that the dark clouds might be the open sesame to the door of good fortune and independence. It is possible that it will provide the urge for a united people to go forward in the face of seeming odds to find a way to self-dependence and security. Man can turn defeat into victory if he develops the moral strength and courage, without fear and trepidation to face adversity. The imminent dark cloud may have behind it hidden the light of inspiration, intuition and adventure to take what we have and make what we want. It might be instrumental in waking us from in-solence and ineptitude.

The New Year just begun is the time for us to make a new resolution to prepare for the impending storm, batten the hatches and man the pumps. For the past two years the sailing has been more or less smooth. The skipper on the bridge has kept his eyes fixed to the stars and has steered the ship of state from the reefs and shoals. Whatever is to come should not panic us, but give us added zeal and impetus to work harder for the good of that state and in benefit to ourselves.

# The Passing Review

Principles Of United Nations A Beacon For World Peace And Progress

For that peace the world seeks today, and the goodwill among men of all races,

In a speech delivered to the National Education Association at the 92nd annual convention of the professional organization of American school teachers, Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, who on Jan. 1, 1955 will take over his duties as UN Under Secretary General, holds to the opinion that "there is no greater fence for social justice and understanding" than the UN.

Member-nations of the world organization are in agreement with the American statesman. No world forum is more forceful in its search for social justice and understanding among peoples throughout the continents than the United Nations. In moving forward to the goals of greater freedom, better life, fuller dignity for mankind, responsible nations are moving closer toward peace and the more productive life without armed conflict for their peoples.

It is not to be expected that in the deliberations of the UN there will be an absence of con-

flicts. But conflicting opinions ventilated through the spoken word soon dissipate their emotional and passionate content, levelling off into understanding and ultimate agreement.

The United Nations, as Dr. Bunche puts it, is motivated by the higher aim of secure peace by digging out the "political, economic and social roots of war; of building firm political, economic and psychological foundations; of reaching the hearts and minds of people; of cultivating people's understanding of each other and their mutual trust and regard."

Cosmopolitan Panama can be likened to the United Nations. Here are people of different tongues, creeds, colors, creeds and customs. Here is to be found a melting pot of old and new world cultures, of varied ambitions and aspirations of a diversity of interests. Over the years the various groups have been working and striving to reach the point of mutual trust and respect for a Panama dedicated to one God, one aim, one destiny.

That this little country has succeeded is evidenced in the fact that all its peoples live more or less amicably in peace and friendship, without ever resorting to armed conflict to resolve their differences. Since becoming a sovereign state in 1903 Panama has had no major rebellion or Political conditions have not always been stable or satisfactory, but instead of force of arms, Panamanians have depended on the force of words and the logic of reason. Here we have a structure of Govern-

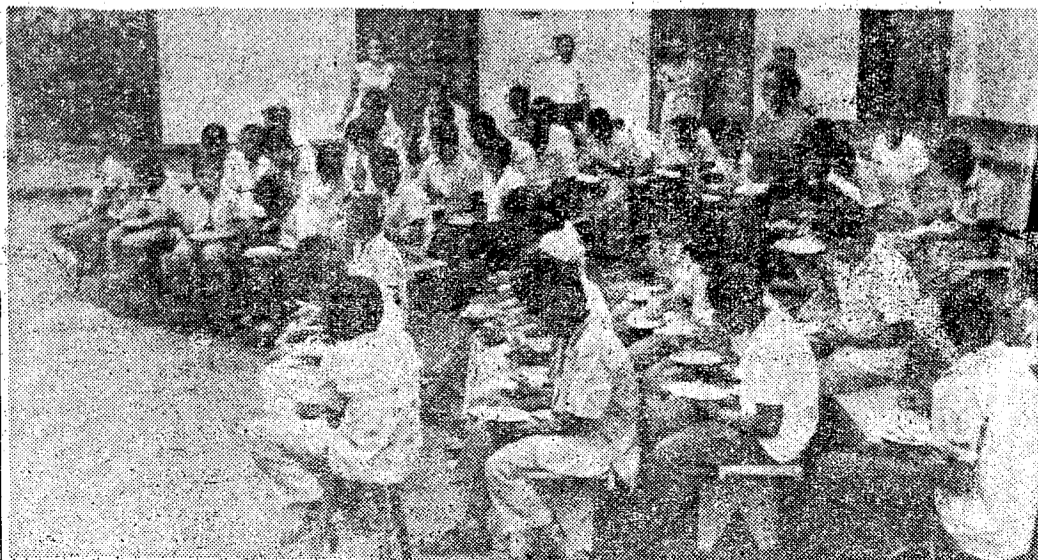
ment similar to the United Nations, inspired by a like desire to narrow the gap between ideal and practice of a democracy.

With each passing year we in Panama develop a greater confidence in our ability to maintain a peaceful existence without servitude and succeed in the mission of peaceful existence, resolving our differences without force of arms. This, too, is the mission of the United Nations so forcefully expressed by Dr. Bunche when he told the educators:

"(To succeed) we must depend on the spirit and attitude of peoples as expressed through their governments, fortified by the knowledge that people can bow to reason, have big hearts, nurture a deep concern for each other's welfare, and though widely diversified in origin, develop, fellow-feeling... I have seen too many evidence of man's capacity for good deeds to be pessimistic on this count... People managing to live together, to respect each other, and to help each along is the fundamental lesson which mankind everywhere must somehow learn if the world peace and progress are to be assured."

As the New Year opens with the beacon light of good will among men shining over our lives, may we travel the road to progress and peace on earth in faith and confidence. May we ever keep in our minds "how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

1955 Forecast For Nations Sees Ominous World Changes

(By P.I.H. NAYLOR, British Astrologist)

INTRODUCTORY

(As every year passes the star-gazer seeks to see a little further ahead. Since the dawn of time Astrologers have been calculating the probabilities of human destiny, comparing planetary configurations with terrestrial events.)

In the heavens as in the world below history repeats itself; it all has happened before in the astrological sense. The problem is to interpret recurrent planetary configuration in terms of the world today.)

There is nothing new in the world set-up as for 1955. The chief protagonists in the world drama have all been on the stage in the year that has just ended. The only problem is —

where will trouble break out first? Will the violence that has disturbed us of late and which is imminent again in 1955 lead to a world conflict?

In so far as I can judge, a general conflict is improbable just yet. There will be try-outs all over the world, though, between the great forces who are measuring up for another war. The clash that threatens us nowadays is not so much one of national interests as of ideologies. The nations that walk under the Communist banner have now less and less in common with those who maintain the old standard of private enterprise and big business.

A few communities here and there will try to walk the middle way. Whether they will succeed or not for any length of time is problematical.

There have been curious portents at work affecting the great of the earth. Certain changes among the leaders of many countries will have been obvious at the end of 1954. 1955 will bring still more exits, notably in the first three months of the year and the last few weeks of 1955. Death will take more than one outstanding man and woman; there will be abdications again in the remaining royal groups. All these mutations are part of a pattern that Fate is weaving and whose outlines we shall not see clearly for another three or four years.

FRANCE

The tension that has been steadily increasing in France throughout 1954 may have brought her a political explosion in November of that year. It that has not come to pass there are some acutely dangerous moments in January, May and July of 1955.

French opinion may appear to swing to the Left for a short time. Out of the political hurly-burly and social stirrings of recent months, however, will emerge a new type of government that will probably endure until the 1960s.

BRITAIN

Britain is likely to be one of the communities that try to walk the middle path in 1955. Political mutations of late 1954 will probably result in a more or less settled state of public life throughout 1955. The con-

flikt between labor and capital will slowly work itself out, be stirred up now and then by the fanatical upward chase of prices and wages.

Defense schemes that involve the whole Commonwealth will make for a change of heart in many of the former Colonies and Dominions. More particularly will the Royal and Merchant Navies be in the news. There will be a drafting of naval power and naval bases to the extreme North and later in the year to the far-South, that is the Antarctic and South Pacific.

GERMANY

By the time these words are in print the questions of a new German army is likely to have been settled and in Germany's favor. For good or ill, the Germans are now back in the world's council meetings, will make their impress felt more and more on world affairs.

ITALY

In Italy, as in France, political forces will be lining up throughout the year. Changes in the Vatican promise to be far more important than similar events have been in the past. As in other parts of the globe the Communists and the anti-Communists will try their strength.

RUSSIA

A slow process of transition will go on in Russia throughout 1955, but the world will not hear much about it this year. Changes will take place at the Kremlin — it is unlikely that Malenkov will survive the twelve months, but the regime holds together for the moment. The Russian bogey will be less of a menace to European nations than it has been since the end of the 1939-45 conflict.

The Russians will probably be having trouble on their own Eastern borders. Russian sea power finds an outlet in the Mediterranean and the Pacific. Before the year is over the Atlantic coast of South America will see some evidence of what Russian navies can do. (To be Continued Next Week)

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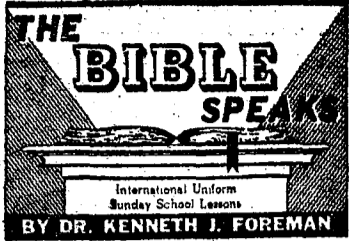


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**THE DAY AFTER**

The day after Christmas lets us down with a thud. So does the day after any great occasion. The songs have been sung, the candles have burned down, some of the toys have already been broken, the dishes have to be washed... we feel tired and flat. For some, it is almost a relief to get back to work, with Christmas "out of our system." Now we should not be surprised at this, nor cry about it. After the Mount of Transfiguration comes a sick boy in a dusty valley. After every high day comes a long string of low days. Religion, the religion of the Bibles, is not a thing intended only for Sundays and holidays. It is religion for the clammy day after.

**The Old Counselor**  
There is one book in the Old Testament which many readers find hard to understand, more than any other. It hardly seems to fit in with the rest of the Bible. Where other writers sing, this one just talks. Where other writers soar into the heavens, this one considers heaven to be so far away that it is not worth while to talk about it. Where other Bible writers are full of hope and optimism, this one is gloomy to his very bones. He could well be called the Philosopher of the Morning After. We have to remember one or two things about "Ecclesiastes" as the writer is not too appropriately called. He is not what we would call a "preacher" for that is what the name Ecclesiastes means. He is more like a columnist, a giver of advice, a counselor. He is not a Christian, and so we must not expect that he will come up to the height from which a Christian sees life. He is an old man, and has "had everything" except happiness. He is not a

complete cynic—that is to say, there are some things in which he does believe. But his beliefs are held, so to speak, under a cloudy sky. It is a wonderful thing that in the Providence of God this book was included in our Bible, for it gives us just what we need when we too are let-down on some dark day after Christmas. The old counselor catches us on the rebound and gives us, if we will listen, some unexciting and perhaps unhelpful but still useful advice for our Days After.

**Dead End Streets**  
The favorite refrain of the Old Counselor is "Vanity of Vanities." Emptiness of Emptiness—lie to him is like one of these nests of boxes sometimes seen on the toy counters: you open the big one and find one not quite so big. You open that and it holds a slightly smaller one... and so on till you come to the tiniest box of all. Must be a diamond?—No, you open it and it's full of Nothing. So this old of man who had had plenty of money and nothing to stop him, went first after one thing and then after another, but he never found happiness. All is Vanity and a Striving after Wind. You can't catch the wind and if you could, so what? He sees nothing in wealth, nothing in pleasure, nothing in learning, nothing in love. Being, as was said, no Christian, he sees nothing even in the next life to lure him on. Beyond this world he sees only "no work, nor device, nor wisdom, nor knowledge, in the grave, whither thou goest." (9:10).

**But Life Must Go On**  
Nevertheless, even this finds some things in life in which he does believe. He be-

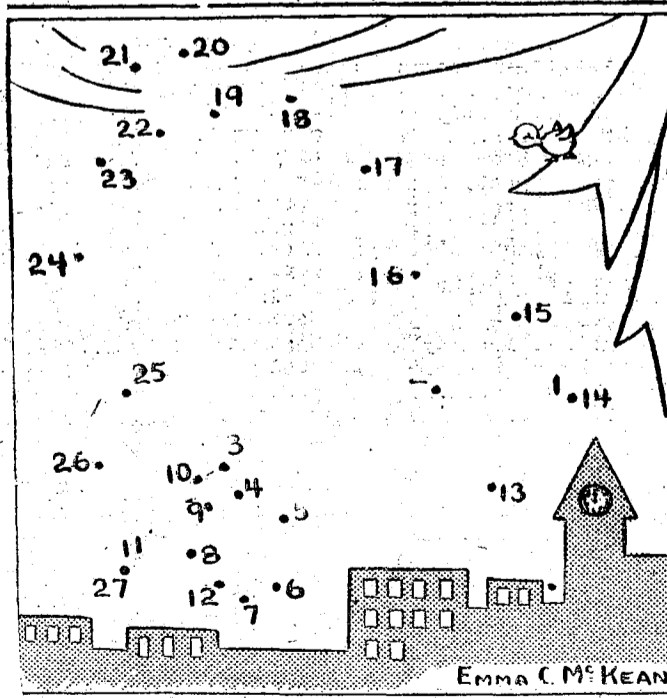


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**Happy New Year Dotograph**
